Charge for activities



Apply for government and foundation grants focused on healthcare education (ex EU funding)



Seek sponsorships from health, pharma, and tech companies for funding and in-kind support.



Offer membership tiers with dues specifically supporting education programmes.



Develop partnerships with academic institutions for joint funding and training programmes.
